And so we begin our Lenten Journey of forty days. The number forty is so symbolic. There were the Chosen People wandering for forty years in the desert. There was the temptation of Our Lord for forty days and forty nights in the desert wilderness. Then, there was my fortieth birthday when I was amusingly given black balloons and declared officially "over-thehill!" (In my naiveté, at first, I thought that those balloons had to do with the fact that I wore priestly black clerics! "No, Father! You're just old!") Birthdays aside, forty is a special number and, scripturally speaking, forty is a sacred number. Today, I heard the number forty mentioned in Sacred Scripture once again. The context was the story of Noah and the Ark, which also speaks to our annual Lenten Journey as well. Noah was the just man and would lay the foundation of a whole new world. It is a story of creation, re-creation, Covenant, and promise. The Flood Story is one of hope for those who survive the perilous waters. For me, the story of Noah

takes me back to my childhood and my Children's Bible (which I still have) from Golden Press. I remember my parents reading to me and I remember the pictures: old Noah (he had to have been at least forty) and all those animals being herded into the Ark. As a kid, I wanted to be Noah, zookeeper extraordinaire. I would wonder what it must have been like. On the one hand, there were all those exotic animals (cool!) and, on the other, there were all those friends and neighbors that thought Noah was nuts (not so cool!). My childhood fixation with Noah became cemented at bit later because of Arco. Remember Arco? Now, I am really showing my age. The Atlantic Richfield Company had a promotion at their gas stations back in the seventies. The promotion had to do with Noah and there was an Arco Station right around the corner from our house where my father would regularly gas up. The company would be giving out a miniature Noah's Ark and little figurines of Noah, Mrs. Noah, and all of the animals to go with it. "Collect them all!" All that was required was a fill-up. "Dad, don't forget to get gas!" I was ever so conscientious as a little guy – just like Noah. I remember missing the zebras or gators or some other animal and making my father go into the station office to talk with the manager. Eventually, I wound up with a complete set, ready to set sail and ride out the Flood! I also remember using that Ark later in grade school for a project. The Ark would be re-fashioned into a canal boat of the 1800s. Much, much later, I would learn of an Ark's being built, literally, to biblical proportions in the State of Kentucky. It would serve as a museum with the purpose of evangelization. Although I was never there, I do know some folks that were and they were fascinated by the exhibit. If I'm ever in Williamstown, KY, I'll be sure to visit. The word "ark" has to do with protection and safety. In his Ark, Noah, his family, and all the animals survived the Great Flood and having survived, they would re-populate the earth and re-create it fulfilling God's Covenantal Promise in the process. As we begin our Lenten Journey, you and I are called to be the Noahs of our day: faithful, righteous, and surviving in order to repopulate and re-create a world gone wicked and wild. In so many ways, it is a matter of returning to our childhood; re-

turning to our innocence, and thanking God that he has chosen us for such a promotion, though it's not a matter of selling gas, but "selling" God. Make sure that you get a complete set this Lent!

Fast and Abstinence and Other Acts of Penance for Lent 2021

The Bishops of the United States prescribe, as minimal obligation, that all persons who are fourteen years of age and older are bound to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2021, on all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday (with the exception of Friday, March 19, The Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary). Further, all persons eighteen years of age and older, up to and including their fifty-ninth birthday, are bound to fast by limiting themselves to a single full meal on Ash Wednesday and on Good Friday, while the other two meals on those days are to be light. All the faithful are encouraged, when possible, to participate at Mass and to receive the Holy Eucharist daily, to celebrate frequently the Sacrament of Penance, to undertake spiritual reading, especially the study of the Sacred Scriptures, and to participate in parish Lenten devotions as well as Lenten education programs. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is especially recommended.
