Baptisms are celebrated the 2nd and 4th Sunday of the month at 12:00 PM.



From time immemorial man has sought to conquer the wilds. From kings to conquistadors and from saints to sinners, new territories have been explored as peoples and cultures have been amalgamated and mixed. Man has always sought to conquer the wilds, but sometimes the wilds win. It was simply meant to be a little time in the wilds of a park nearby; an outing into the woods; a bit of exercise, relaxation, rejuvenation, and a rediscovery of nature on a Sunday afternoon. It all started out well enough on the sunny day. The trail chosen had been tended to by previous explorers. Tremendously overgrown, it had been cut back much by some intrepid predecessor and thus perhaps, the want for revenge. Cutback thickets seemingly thrashed out at me that day. The bloody stripes on my arms and legs were like those of a man sentenced to forty lashes. However, there was no going back, but only pressing onwards. I stumbled; I tripped, but I kept going. On one turn of the trail, the angry brambles reached out grabbing my foot and thrust me to the ground. I slid partway down a slope landing sideways on my hip with the palm of my hand pierced by a thorn as I landed. The holy mark of stigmata, I thought, as the blood trickled down my hand and my bruised hip began to hurt. Continuing onward, I twice had to crawl on my hands and knees in order to get through a "tunnel" of angry brush. It clawed at my head, back, hands, and knees. After a bit more lashing and thrashing, I finally emerged from the summit trail. The wilds had won that day and my body had paid a price. Leaving the woods behind and making my way across a field, I thought that I was in the clear. I would return to where my ship was docked, admit defeat, and call it a day as I sailed off into the sunset. A soothing, albeit stinging, shower would be in order. But alas, even the field came to the forest's defense that day. I went to step over a mere twig of a branch lying on the ground, but the branch reached up and ensnared my shoe throwing me to the ground. I was an explorer exhausted and spent. The wilds had won. When I got home, it was then that I discovered that even the seat of my short pants had split. It must have happened on the slide down the slope. How humiliating! I thought that I had felt a tad of a breeze. Later that night as I nursed my wounds, I realized something. Yes, the woods had gotten the best of me that day, but the woods hadn't "won." I won the woods; I won the wilds and I won the day. The win was in my effort. It was, in fact, a beautiful day weather-wise and despite stumbles, falls, and cuts I did actually enjoy the day. My wounds were my badges of honor and besides, I'd have a great (although a bit embarrassing) story to tell. Sometimes in our faith life and in life in general, we may feel that the wilds or the world or the devil has gotten the best of us. The reality is that by making the effort and engaging, we've already won. Our Lord is that Intrepid Explorer, Who has already cut back the trail for us. We need only follow where He has already gone. Though there might be a stumble or fall along the way with any number of cuts and bruises, as long as we keep going, we will finally emerge from the wooded wilds and realize then that we have won. In the meantime, keep going; forge ahead - and watch the seat of your pants!



Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

One of life's persistent questions is "What if?" If we answer by looking back on our lives, we could face heaps of regret. If we gaze into the future, we may get carried away with our daydreams or forget about the contingency of all things. But once in awhile, we get pleasant answers to the question, well-grounded and uplifting. Case in point: this weekend's Gospel passage. The unspoken variant is this: "What if Jesus were to explain some of His parables?" Fortunately for us, here He did.

As always, we admire Jesus' ingenuity as a teacher, using what is familiar to His audience at the time, in this case some rural workers. But as part of the Divine Word referred to by Isaiah, what Jesus said is addressed to a much wider audience than the original one. That happens to include you and me.

Now, some of us may actually have been sowers, at least when we spread grass seed on threadbare patches of our front lawn. Therefore the result of our sowing is also a bit chancy. We marvel when the seed catches on. Not so for (dare I call Him?) "Farmer Jesus!"

Perhaps because we have heard this parable many times, we pivot right to its application. Of the four landing places for the seed, we ask, "Which one am I?" Here we must guard against being cavalier about our answer. We may conclude that because we're hearing the parable at Mass, we have the right to say "I must be that good soil." Or, we could go in the opposite direction and hastily condemn ourselves for being "rocky soil" or even "thorns."

May I humbly suggest that, if you're anything like me, you have been all four types at various points in life. Our spiritual lives always seem to be "works in progress." That's because they are. It's a matter of two steps backwards for every one step forward." Of course, with no sarcasm meant, you just may be one of those hidden saints that have always been part of the Church, even though you would never say so about yourself.

But for the majority of us there is usually this bouncing back and forth. That could make me worry, which Our Lord said elsewhere is foolish. I am grateful that the Holy Spirit gives us St. Paul, one very transparent saint. He freely admits his progress and regression in the matter of his behavior. But note what Paul writes to us in today's Second Reading: "I consider the sufferings of this present time as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us." Our very vacillation is a form of suffering. (So is coping with all the effects we have endured of Covid 19, although that is subject for another reflection.)

So, taking St. Paul's words to heart, we do not have to waste our time worrying about our eternal glory being in jeopardy because of our unintended relapses. As long as we repent and rise up to try again, we will see God face to face and experience a peace and joy unmatched by anything here on earth.

As for questions like "What if?" the evangelist Vance Havner (d. 1986) wrote this: "There are a lot of questions the Bible doesn't answer about the Hereafter. But I think one reason is illustrated by the story of a boy sitting down to a bowl of spinach when there's a chocolate cake at the end of the table. He's going to have a rough time eating that spinach when his eyes are on the cake. And if the Lord had explained everything to us about what's ours to come, I think we'd have a rough time with our spinach down here."
