Baptisms are celebrated the 2nd and 4th Sunday of the month at 12:00 PM.



I didn't get into trouble for not doing the dishes. I got into trouble for doing them – incorrectly. Many children today are raised with the luxury of having a machine dishwasher. This child was not. He was the dishwasher. Now, "doingthe-dishes" often enough means simply feeding the dishwashing machine. I suppose that today children might get into trouble for that as well, as they misfeed, underfeed, or forget to feed the machine. Perhaps it might be best just to take it out for a walk. My trouble had to do with running water – or more precisely, letting the water run and run and run. As I meticulously cleaned off each dish, I simply let the water run and then, I would rinse off each dish under the running water. It was my father's bark that startled me



causing me to splash soapy water all over the counter. "What are you doing," he roared! "The dishes," I sheepishly answered. "Not like that!" "Turn off the water!" My father then showed me the proper way to wash having honed his washing skills in the army well before he ranked Sergeant and was ordering others to the task as he was now ordering me. "You don't need to let the water run." "Soak the dish in the soapy water and then clean it off with the sponge. If needed, soak it again and scrub. Then turn the water on ever so slightly and rinse off the dish. Don't ever waste water!" Well, I always thought that I was a better dish dryer anyway, but with the sergeant standing over my shoulder, I heeded my father's advice. Truth be told, I was more focused on the dishwater in the sink as it became murkier and murkier with each scrubbed pot and pan. There were floaters and food barnacles. I really didn't want to put my hands into that nor the plate from which I would be eating the next day. Yuck! However, the "sarge" was right. I had been wasting water and dish soap. That day, as a youngster, I finally learned how to do the dishes – correctly. Maybe our Lenten Journey is something like this. Washing the dishes seems to be such a simple and straightforward thing – except when it's not. Lent can seem rather straightforward and simple as well: forgo some candy for a few weeks, maybe make a quick confession, throw up a short prayer or two, and voila, it's time to celebrate Easter. Is there a better way? Is there a way more proper? Is there a way which doesn't waste so much soap and water? It was my own father that had to teach me the proper way to wash dishes. Allow God the



Father to teach you. All of us need review our Lenten "washing" techniques. Perhaps, I can pray and attend Mass more intentionally. Maybe my goal should be not to make a quick confession, but a good one. As for the giving up of candy, one might do better in giving up animosity towards a spouse, sibling, son, or daughter. Proper technique makes all the difference. Find yours this Lent and arrive at Easter clean, shiny, renewed, and ready to make your place setting at the Resurrection Supper of the Lamb!
