Baptisms are celebrated the 2nd and 4th Sunday of the month at 12:00 PM.



The advent of warmer weather generally means more time spent outdoors. This was certainly true for me in my younger days. The neighborhood kids would gather together and play an assortment of games after school. As the days got longer and warmer, sometimes those games would extend into the early evening after a break for dinner and so long as homework was complete. In the summer months, playing our games might well last until 10 or 10:30 at night. Everyone would go home sweaty and dirty needing to get washed up before crawling into bed. The next day it would start all over. We played several different games. Most folks are familiar with them, though they might go by different names. There was the standard, "tag." "Tag, you're it!" Then there was the variation known as "freeze tag." We played a lot of "kick, kick the can" and "ghost in the graveyard" was fun late at night during the summer months. At school, we played "capture" and the infamous "kill the guy." "Kill the guy" has gone the way of the wagon wheel, perhaps for good reason. First of all, there was the name of the game itself - and this at a Catholic school nonetheless! Also, there was no real point to the game except to chase after and pile on top of "the guy." It was an all boys' game for sure. Sorry, girls! "The guy" was the one holding somebody's balled up necktie and he had best start running - quickly. Generally, somebody's necktie was "volunteered" as we held him down and ripped it away from his blue-collared shirt. Navy blue neck ties were later returned to their owners bearing splashes of brown, green, and red from the mostly grass field where we recessed. The red tint on ties was from the blood that was frequently spilled. Oh, but it was great fun! Our teachers enjoyed the fact that it burned up a whole lot of our youthful energies resulting in a quieter, albeit, smellier, afternoon in the classroom. Needless to say, cans of Lysol were a classroom requisite for the faculty. I'm rather surprised that "kill the guy" was never killed off in my day. The game resulted in an untold number of ruined neckties, countless ripped shirts, and pants with holes in the knees or kiester. Pockets on said shirts and pants didn't fair too well either. Then, there was the assortment of broken bones and bruised heads over the years. Even my classmate's collapsed lung didn't cause the game to be forever cancelled and he would be back for more games after he was released from the hospital. I'm fortunate that I escaped with some mere ripped clothes, welts, and a bruised noggin. Outdoor game-playing is all a part of growing up. It involves some team work, ingenuity, and imagination. Even the seemingly senseless roughhousing that we did as boys was a part of forming young boys into young men. We learned to roughhouse together. We learned that a few







scrapes and bruises were a part of life. They didn't hold us back, but spurred us on. Tattered and torn clothes would be mended, thanks to our loving mothers and fathers. Sure we got chewed out at times when the roughhousing got a little too rough, resulting in ambulances dispatched, but together we made a get-well card that everyone signed to cheer up James during his hospital stay and he happily and proudly showed off his bandaged chest when he returned. If I'm not mistaken, Jesus Himself, did something similar. Having been treated terribly in our roughhousing gone horribly wrong, He returns risen and "mended" because of a Father's loving concern. He shows us the wounds that he bore, not to discourage us, but to encourage us to keep playing and growing despite some scrapes and bruises along the way that through team work, ingenuity, and imagination, together with God's grace, we might grow and be truly mature in our Faith, especially now as the weather turns warmer in the Springtime of Easter!
