Baptisms are celebrated the 2nd and 4th Sunday of the month at 12:00 PM.



And suddenly, there they were. It was rather biblical really. Rocco, Roman, and Daniel were setting out to reconnoiter the land; to see for themselves; to give report of that which had been so promised. A new school year was just on the other side of the Jordan. It would be different from that of the past. There would be new teachers and new rules. There would be need for sanitizing and social distancing; mask wearing and more hand washing than ever. The three young men were perusing the grounds and peeking in the windows of Holy Cross School. They would soon be on the inside looking out. The three boys saw me crossing the parking lot and rode their bikes towards me. We talked. They had many questions. It was good to see them. It had been quite a while – since March, in fact. They seemed eager to get back to school, yes, but more so, like all of us, eager to get back to some sense of normalcy. The "fun" of a very unexpected and long "coronacation" was definitely over. It was time to cross the Jordan. That crossing took place on Tuesday of this past week, when Holy Cross School opened its doors for the new school year welcoming my three young friends along with the rest of the whole school community. Preparing to open our school has not been an easy endeavor in our COVID world of 2020. There have been many meetings, much dialogue, and the crafting of guidelines and protocols bearing in mind current (and constantly changing, it seems) federal, state, local, and archdiocesan health and safety regulations. Special kudos and thanks need to be given to our school principal (Dr. Mary Rose Worrilow), maintenance staff (Mr. Ron Gardner and Mr. Mike Thompson), school secretary (Mrs. Ellen Spurrier), and faculty both new and old who have worked so hard to make sure that we can safely and confidently open the doors of our school once again. Special thanks to our Knights of Columbus also. Some men of the K of C volunteered in helping to get some painting work done. It's been a busy summer! There is a new public address/phone system in school, hand sanitizing stations, deep cleaning/disinfection equipment, and safety shielding. Virtual learning is an option some parents have chosen. School is certainly the same, and yet, very different. My three young friends can tell you that. I suppose it was that way too on that day when the reconnoiterers and all of the Chosen People finally crossed the Jordan entering the Promised Land. The land itself, probably looked much the same once on the other side, though one's feet were now wet. Though the land may have looked the same at first, it wasn't the same. The difference was the Promise. This was the land that God had promised and God's promise was one of blessing and fruitfulness and hope. This is the same promise that our new school year brings even in the midst of our ongoing corona pandemic with all of its attending anxiety and uncertainty. This is something, I believe, that the boys knew instinctively that day as they circled the school on their bikes checking things out and reconnoitering. It's what a Catholic School is all about. May God bless and keep safe all of our students, faculty, and staff as they begin the new school year at Holy Cross! It is one filled with great Promise!

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

The History Channel is one of my favorites, especially when its programming matches its name. Over this summer I was able to watch a series called "The Men Who Built America." It was all about the tycoons, sometimes tyrannical men who captured the industrial revolution and made it work both for them and for our burgeoning country. Allow me to single out Cornelius Vanderbilt, who expanded our country's railroads and made its expansion happen by ulti-mately connecting people from coast to coast. Of course, Cornelius himself never lifted a shovel. He labored over investments and the workers' paychecks being available.

On this eve of Labor Day, it must be said that railroad construction in those days was largely a matter of hand labor with picks and shovels. It was hard work to say the least, and it is amazing what the workers produced. But it is a good thing to celebrate all laborers in our own time, and to honor the good benefits of work.

It so happens that our Scriptures this weekend speak of a different kind of labor: very real and the complete opposite of gang work. It is called "fraternal correction." What is it? It is the "admonishing of one's neighbor by a private individual with the purpose of reforming him, or, if possible, preventing his sinful indulgence." So it is a private matter, usually between good friends, in which one takes the initiative in pointing out the other's incipient or ongoing problem. It's Harry or Harriet calling their close buddy aside and saying things like "You have bad halitosis", or "You've been drinking a lot lately", or "The boss is concerned that you're coming in late too much." The range is as wide as the human situation permits.

Granted, this is difficult, and we have a natural tendency to avoid it. We wonder whether, after offering our counsel, we will still have a friend. But if our friendship runs deeper than a surface kind of thing, it becomes essential.

This concept runs through the Old and New Testaments. We read today that Ezekiel is commanded to do it, and if he does not, he faces his own peril of death. Jesus practiced it. Recall His response when Peter urged Him to dismiss the idea of suffering and death as part of His mission: "Get behind Me, Satan!"

As consolation, presumably here to those of us who accept the challenge of correcting a brother or sister, Jesus offers His promise to be present when as little as two people are gathered in His name. He knows the difficulty. He admires our courage. He makes the generous gift.

In the movie "Chariots of Fire," young Harold Abrahams, a champion sprinter, had just suffered his first-ever defeat. After the race, he sat alone, pouting in the bleachers. When his girlfriend tried to encourage him, he bellowed, "If I can't win, I won't run!" To which she wisely, and with courage replied, "If you don't run, you can't win." God love you and give you His peace. And Happy Labor Day!
